

Herbert Lasky grew up in Manhattan, New York, the child of hard working Orthodox Jewish parents. As a child he was drawn to classical music, but his family did not have the wherewithal to guide him in his interest. As he grew older, especially during his years studying at New York University, culminating in a PhD in History, and while teaching at NYU and Hunter and Queen's Colleges (CUNY), he attended concerts, often at Carnegie Hall and on his own learned about the wonderful music he heard. His early experiences in New York confirmed in him two personal aspirations to support talented musicians whenever the opportunity presented itself, and to assist young people to learn about music. After he moved out to Illinois to teach history at Eastern Illinois University he found an immense talent in Dr. Richard Rossi, who created and conducted the EIU Symphony Orchestra and Choirs groups. Over many years Dr. Lasky, together with his wife Jane, supported Dr. Rossi's endeavors at the university, notably purchasing instruments to be used by students learning and playing in the orchestra, including a magnificent harpsichord and many wind instruments. Most recently, Dr. Lasky has also supported the creation of a graduate assistantship at the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana focused on training a Music student in broadcasting educational programming about classical music. And of course, Dr. Lasky has continued his long-standing support of Dr. Rossi, contributing generously to Dr. Rossi's latest project, Transcendence, Erie's first all-professional choir.
